The **Haggadah** (Hebrew: הַּגְּדָה, "telling"; plural: **Haggadot**)

is a Jewish text that sets forth the order of the Passover Seder. According to Jewish practice, reading the Haggadah at the Seder table is a fulfillment of the mitzvah to each Jew to tell their children the story from the Book of Exodus about God bringing the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, with a strong hand and an outstretched arm.

The *Midrash* (/ˈmɪdrɑːʃ/; Hebrew: מְּדְרָשִׁים, pl. מְדְרָשִׁים *midrashim* or מְדְרָשִׁים *midrashot*) is expansive Jewish Biblical exegesis using a rabbinic mode of interpretation prominent in the Talmud. The word itself means "textual interpretation", "study", or "exegesis", derived from the root verb *darash* (דְּרַשֵׁ), which means "resort to, seek, seek with care, enquire, require", forms of which appear frequently in the Hebrew Bible.
